# November Bonsai by John Miller

Be sure to mark your calendar for the LSBF convention in April next year. It will be held in Dallas on April 20-22 at the Holiday Inn Select on Mockingbird Lane across from Love Field. Registration forms and info will be available in late October and also on the club website (www.bonsaisocietyofdallas.com). Headliners will be Marco Invernizzi, Boon Manakivisipart, Suthin Sukosolvisit, and Shane Cary. Michael Hagedorn, Howard and Sylvia Smith, and I will also be participating.

Not too much has to be done right now. That is if you prepared last month and you have no tropicals inside to care for. The big thing is to know what temperatures your trees can withstand and to remember that water is important in the winter time.



Since the trees are not using as much water during dormancy, it is easy to overlook checking on them. The low humidity usually found during winter helps dry the soil. Winter sun can be pretty hot and if it shines directly on the pot it will hasten the drying process. Winter will usually also be windier. Therefore, however you bed down the trees, you need to check the dryness often. The same trees that needed more water last summer will also need to be checked more often during the winter. I think that more trees are lost during the winter to having the soil dry out than from the actual cold.

Deciduous trees should not be placed where they receive winter sun. After a period of dormancy, the heating of the tree could possibly cause it to break dormancy prematurely. If that happened you would need to keep it above freezing the rest of the winter. After they go dormant they have no need for any sunshine.

Evergreen types especially and deciduous to a lesser extent should not have the root ball subjected to alternate freezing and thawing. That process tends to tear and damage the roots. Placing the trees on the ground and using a mulch will minimize this problem.

Plants have different degrees of hardiness for their top growth and their roots. The reason being that the ground acts as a large reservoir of heat and, here in Texas, it seldom freezes more than an inch or two down. Therefore, plants like the pomegranate and crepe myrtle which are at the northern extent of their range outside will not be hardy to freezing in pots. Any plant that you are unsure of should be protected from freezing. This can be a problem because if they are not kept cool after they go dormant they will break dormancy and start to grow too soon. Growing without sufficient light causes long spindly growth which you cannot control. My best solution for this when I lived in town was to have a long platform with two wheels that I pulled into the garage on nights where freezing was forecast and kept outside at all other times.

The cold weather will keep any insect problems under control outside. In winter, you should use a dormant oil spray to kill overwintering insects and their eggs. You can also use lime sulfur in a dormant spray solution which will also help with fungal problems. Be sure to follow the label directions when mixing and using the lime sulfur. It can be dangerous stuff if misused. You should watch for damage from rodent types, rabbits, squirrel, and rats. They will prune branches and strip bark rather quickly.

Bonsai in greenhouses or indoor bonsai will need to be watched for the normal indoor problems. Low humidity, spider mites and scales are the biggest problems here. Aphids can also show up. Trying to keep the humidity up by placing you trees on a humidity tray can possibly give you some soil problems, root rot or some other fungal disease. I use the same controls in the greenhouse that I use outside all year.

You can take advantage of the winter slowdown by spending your time getting pots ready for spring, clean and sharpen your tools, study what changes you would like to make on your trees and so forth.

On bonsai basics: Other than going to Bonsaismiths and buying a good bonsai, there are four steps to getting something to be proud of.

- 1. Obtaining good raw material: Go on club digs, scour nurseries (you got to really dig there too), look for material from growers.
- 2. Styling to realize the trees full potential: To learn, you must do lots of workshops and participate in round-robin discussions. Understand the why as well as the what of styling.
- 3. Development of the branches: Keep your shears with you when watering; keep after the trees when actively growing. Do not let new shoots get long. Lots of twigs mean smaller leaves.
- 4. Maintaining that development: This entails learning to do rejuvenation pruning and proper fertilization.

Of these four I consider the last one the most important. Not maintaining the tree properly is akin to obtaining a master's painting and then letting a two year old use crayons to 'improve' it. It grows out of shape fast.

# Lone Star Bonsai Federation Meeting Minutes October 21st, 2006

The meeting was called to order at 1:10 by President, John Denton.

John called for any changes to the minutes of the last meeting. Pat Ware indicated that the end of the meeting should be around 3:00 and not 2:00 as indicated. A motion was made and carried to approve the minutes as amended.

### Treasurer's Report

Pat Ware presented the Treasurer's Report. She reported that when all the outstanding bills were paid, the treasury would be down to around \$2,200. She suggested we wait until Corpus Christi gave their convention results before the board votes on whether to reimburse the clubs some money for the Cheryl Manning tour. A motion was made and carried to approve the Treasurers Report.

#### **LSBF** Conventions

2006 - Yvonne Padilla indicated that the LSBF Convention in Corpus Christi in 2006 had produced a profit of \$14,105.57. She presented the board with a check for \$7,05.78. Corpus was roundly applauded for the quality of the convention.

2007 – John Miller discussed the upcoming convention in Dallas. He indicated that a website was not up yet but would soon be available and that registration would be available on-line. At the Dallas convention they would like to have a more formal exhibit. They are trying to encourage more participation by offering awards for "Best of" trees. John delivered to each club representative copies of the registration forms for their members. More information will be forthcoming.

2008 - Marty Klajnowski discussed the 2008 convention which will be hosted jointly by San Antonio, Austin and the American Bonsai Society.

The convention will be held June 19-22, 2008.

They have a contract with the Tropicana Hotel on the river walk for \$119/night and have reserved a block of 245-250 rooms.

It will be a seminar with no workshops. Each registrant will pick the seminars which they wish to attend. All seminars are 3 hours.

The convention begins on Thursday with an all day styling competition of 10 artists sponsored by Joshua Roth Tools.

ABS will handle the registration, airline tickets, and contracting with artists.

San Antonio and Austin will handle goodie bags, raffles, and the convention pin.

The split of proceeds will be 40% ABS, 20% San Antonio, 20% Austin, and 20% LSBF.

The ABS requested that we provide the names of several artists that we would like to see present seminars at the convention. Marty took down several names and will pass them on.

Convention Attendance – Buddy Allen was not present to discuss this issue with the board.

#### LSBF Speaker Tour

2006 - Ron Smith was not present to discuss the speaker tour but all agreed that Cheryl Manning was personable and a skilled artist. A motion was made and passed by a vote of 6 to 1 that the LSBF reimburse the clubs \$150 each for the tour.

2007 – John Denton announced that Ron Smith had resigned as chairman of the 2007 tour and asked for volunteers. Yvonne Padilla said that she would arrange the tour if we invited Pedro Morales as the visiting artist. It was moved and approved before she could change her mind.

### **Expanding the LSBF**

Marty Klajnowski presented a proposal for the LSBF to consider expanding the federation to include adjoining states. This was presented as one means of fighting the decline in clubs and memberships in the past few years. The LSBF had, in the past, been approached by outside clubs to join the federation. She proposed that the LSBF would retain the same name but include other clubs in full or associative memberships. Yvonne proposed that we take this issue back our respective clubs and bring their questions and concerns back to be discussed at the next meeting.

#### **Next Meetings**

Pat Ware canvassed the attendees on their impression of the suitability of the LCRA Board Room as an alternative to Zilker Park. Pat indicated that, while a kitchen is not available, it is still workable for her for serving a light lunch. It was then suggested that the members could eat before arriving and give Pat a break in her lunch preparations. All agreed, so there will be no lunch served before subsequent meetings.

Dates were proposed for the next year's (2007) meetings. They are:

January 20, 2007 June 9, 2007 October 13, 2007

All meetings will begin at 1:00 and will be held at the LCRA Board Room located in the Hancock building at 3700 Lake Austin Blvd.

A motion was made and passed to adjourn the meeting. The meeting was adjourned at 3:06.

You will find some of the old and some new things at the 25th LSBF convention to be held in Dallas next year. It will be held on April 20-22, 2007, at the Holiday Inn Select, 3300 West Mockingbird Lane, across from Dallas Love Field. This happens to be the same hotel as the first Dallas LSBF convention, but was then the Executive Inn.

We will return to the original format of having evening demonstrations after the Friday and Saturday dinners. There will also be other lectures and demos during the day.

The convention theme, Art Education & Excellence, points to the convention being more than cutting on trees. The exhibit is planned to be more formal - along the lines of Kokofu-ten in Japan. We wish something like a three point display (tree, accent, and companion with appropriate stands). We also wish to encourage all LSBF members to consider displaying as was done in the early years. There will be prizes for the best displays. Exact details have not been completed but should be like best in show, 2nd and 3rd or possibly best in show, best evergreen, best deciduous, etc. Also, it may well be that the best display will be the winner, not the best individual tree.


